



Good Night Stories for Rebel Girls by Elena Favilli and Francesca Cavalio





A simple, moving story which is the perfect way to gently open discussion around the refugee crisis.



Over and Under the Pond by Kate Messner

Under the pond, leeches lurk, crayfish scuttle under rocks, nymphs build intricate shells, and microscopic animals broak build intricate shells, and microscopic animals break down fallen leaves to recharge the water with nutrients. Over the pond, fuzzy cattails sway in the breeze, and a pair of loons swim by, laughing in the dappled sunlight. An author's note discusses not only the different organisms featured, but also the truly remarkable balance of this wetland ecosystem, the way plants and animals create a chemical balance that sustains the lives of the pond.



Don't Touch My Hair by Sharee Miller




